

History:

In 1929, Mrs. Ethel A. Carty Woman's Club of Claymont began the first library in Claymont's Stone Schoolhouse with approximately 600 donated books. By 1945, the library officially became the Claymont Public Library.

Initially, volunteers staffed the Claymont Public Library, until 1975, when the New Castle County Department of Libraries assumed responsibility for the library and a professional staff was hired. But, it was not until 1988 that the Library was moved from the Stone School to the Claymont Community Center.


In May 1997, a tragic arson fire destroyed 32,000 books, almost the entire collection, just as the library was about to relocate. Later that same year, the Claymont Public Library reopened in its present, larger, 65,000 square foot facility in the southeast corner of the Claymont Community Center. After the fire, the Claymont community came forward and overwhelmed the library staff with their generosity, donating books from their own shelves. Many in Claymont refer to the library as the Phoenix Project, because out of the ashes of the old library has risen a new, expanded library — one that exists because of the goodwill, support, and dedication of the surrounding community.

Most recently, the Claymont Public Library was joined with the Concord Pike Library under one library manager.

General Description:

The Claymont Library is located in a former school building that has been converted into a community center. The Library shares the facility with a number of community services including the Boys and Girls Club, a Head Start program, and Family Health Services. Off street parking is provided although competition for parking spaces is stiff due to the large number of agencies residing in the building. The entrance to the Library is not highly visible. There is very little natural light and, in spite of efforts to brighten the interior by having white walls and light color wood finishes, the Library still seems a bit dark. The density of shelving units leaves relatively little room for user seating.

Six Year Circulation Trend:

Circulation increased significantly between FY 2000 and FY 2002, stayed steady in FY 2003 and then dropped by thirty percent (29.8%) in FY 2004. The increase in circulation happened during the time that Concord Pike was closed and Brandywine Hundred was not yet open. FY 2004 circulation is a return to a more representative ongoing circulation for Claymont. It represents a six percent (6.3%) increase over FY 2000 circulation.
